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CO-CHAIRS' REPORT

2024 was another successful year for Sunshine Centres for Seniors! We provided a full slate of in-person programs and activities for seniors living in inner city neighbourhoods in downtown Toronto, and our Camp Sunshine program on the Toronto Islands operated in full swing in the summer. We also continued to offer virtual activities for seniors who still feel more comfortable participating from the safety of their homes.

Our programs and events were very well attended, with attendance up significantly from 2023, when the affect of the pandemic was still with us. The number of individuals attending our programs overall increased 120% from 2023, with Camp Sunshine numbers increasing by 157%.

We took on a new program this fall - the Seniors Assistance Home Maintenance Program, which provides snow shovelling in the winter and yard maintenance in the summer for seniors. The program supports seniors living safely and independently in the community and is funded by the City of Toronto. It fits well with our mission, and will spread the word about Sunshine Centres to the seniors who use this service. We'd like to thank our staff, both program staff and management, for their continuing enthusiasm, energy, creativity and hard work. We'd like to particularly thank Jacquie Buncel for her dedication to our seniors this year and over the past many years. Many thanks also to our volunteers who help in so many ways to supplement our staff and allow us to serve more seniors. Thank you to our fellow board members whose wise counsel helps us and Jacquie steer the organization through the ups and downs of managing a non-profit.

We also want to thank all of our funders, without whom we couldn't continue to operate: all three levels of government (federal, provincial and municipal), the United Way Greater Toronto, as well as many private funders and foundations. Thanks go to the Ontario Trillium Foundation for their threeyear grant that allowed us to deliver the "Sunshine in the East" programs in three sites in Toronto's east end. And a very special thanks to our major private supporter for the past several years, the George C. Hunt Family Foundation, whose generous grant has allowed us to expand our programs and to reach many more seniors.

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Sunshine Centres for Seniors thrived in 2024 with many exciting and innovative projects as well as our enjoyable and meaningful programs. Over 2,100 seniors participated in our many activities with 11,780 visits to our programs over the course of the year. Camp Sunshine had a particularly successful season with 68 groups bringing their seniors for a fun-filled day outing to the beautiful Toronto Islands.

We completed the third and final year of our Ontario Trillium Foundation Grow project which allowed us to offer three successful programs in Toronto's east end. The grant ended in June and we had to close one site; however, we are pleased to continue with two of the program sites.

An Ontario Trillium Foundation Capital project gave us the opportunity to replace our aging furniture and appliances, increase our storage capacity, and add new program equipment. We also purchased reusable dishes which will allow us to reduce our expenses, waste, and environmental footprint.

Thank you to our funders from all three levels of government, United Way Greater Toronto, and the many foundations and individual donors which gave us the opportunity to improve the lives of isolated seniors. I am very grateful to the George C. Hunt Family Foundation for their ongoing dedication and generosity to Sunshine Centres this year and so many other years.

Thank you to our staff team for all of their hard work, energy, passion, and enthusiasm this year. I would like to express my thanks to our Board of Directors for their support and leadership, especially our two Co-Chairs, Susan Roller and Veena Balram for their encouragement and guidance.

We were very successful this year in meeting our mandate of spreading sunshine. Thank you to everyone who helped to make this happen!

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IN-PERSON PROGRAMS

CAMP SUNSHINE

We provided a comprehensive program with 80 camp sessions, welcoming 68 community groups, retirement homes, and long-term care facilities for lively day outings at our cottage-like centre. Activities ranged from golf cart rides and sing-a-longs to gentle fitness sessions, nature walks, crafts, games, and socializing opportunities. A total of 1,664 seniors participated in Camp Sunshine, contributing to a robust summer attendance of 2,143 visits.



In 2024, Camp Sunshine on Ward's Island brought joy to our seniors with five exciting community events, including our Intergenerational Rainbow Pride Festival, Strawberry Festival, 50's Sock Hop, Mosaic Fall Harvest Festival, and 3 Xenia Concerts. Fun and connection filled the air, creating cherished memories for all.

The St. James Town Program at Sunshine Centres continues to be a welcoming and vital hub for low-income, racialized, and 2SLGBTQIA+ seniors. Our culturally responsive programming includes gentle exercise, discussion groups, music, arts and crafts, educational workshops, games, brain trivia, outings, intergenerational initiatives, holiday celebrations, and nutritious meals and refreshments. In response to growing demand at our 460 Jarvis site, we expanded our service delivery by adding an extra program day. By fostering social connection, joy, and belonging, the St. James Town Program offers a vibrant and supportive space where older adults can connect, thrive, and celebrate community.

RAINBOW PROGRAMS

- 2SLGBTQIA+ seniors enjoyed a wide variety of outings to the AGO, the ROM, Shevchenko Museum, Spadina Museum, Edwards Gardens and more.

Our Rainbow program tailored for 2SLGBTQIA+ seniors continued to thrive in 2024 with dynamic conversations, creative arts and crafts, and enlightening educational workshops. This inclusive program provided a safe space for 2SLGBTQIA+ seniors to connect, share experiences, and create deep bonds while participating in activities like games, trivia, light exercise, and community outings.

SACKVILLE

Seniors Together: A Place For All

We inaugurated the Sackville site in 2014 in response to a request from Bengali seniors in TCHC buildings who were experiencing language barriers to participating in social and recreational programs. This lively program has grown to serve many diverse seniors, in particular Chinese-Canadian seniors within the community. The Sackville Program is thriving with enjoyable activities and a sense of camraderie and connection.



To address the need for seniors services in Toronto's east end, we launched a new initiative in 2021, made possible by a generous grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation. Sunshine in the East offered activities at 2 Toronto Seniors Housing buildings and at the East York Community Centre. This project provides seniors in the east end of the city with opportunities to gather, socialize, engage in enjoyable activities, and participate in exercise programs, fostering a sense of community and well-being. Unfortunately, the funding for this project ended in June of this year and we had to close our East York Community Centre program. However, we have continued to offer activities at two program sites, and many of the participants from the East York Community Centre site are joining our programs at other locations. Throughout the year, we were able to serve and support 219 seniors with 2,546 visits.

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VIRTUAL PROGRAMS

Sunshine Centres continued to offer virtual programs for seniors who prefer to participate from home. Activities have included Mandarin and Cantonese-speaking programs, Virtual Bingo with prizes, Coffee/Tea/Sunshine Chats, Book Club, Recorder Lessons, and Gentle Exercise. In Fall 2024, Virtual Bingo was discontinued due to increased demand for in-person sessions. These programs remain a meaningful way to stay connected, especially for those with mobility challenges.



SUNSHINE AFTER HOURS

Our Sunshine After Hours virtual program caters to our Bengali community members. Led by staff fluent in Bengali, our evening sessions offer social connections, engaging activities and community involvement.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Sunshine Centres for Seniors continued to deliver our many programs and projects this year. Our biggest challenge was the conclusion of a 3 year GROW grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation in June 2024 which had given us the opportunity to open 3 new successful sites in Toronto's east end. Unfortunately, due to budget constraints, we had to close one site; however, we were able to use fundraising revenue to continue our programs at two of the sites.

We received funding from all levels of government as well as generous support from foundations, corporations, and individual donors. Revenue was slightly lower than in 2023 resulting in a small deficit of \$1,534 which was taken out of our Operating Reserve Fund. We are deeply grateful to the George C. Hunt Family Foundation for their very generous contribution this year towards our programs for isolated seniors, meals for the seniors, our volunteer program, and our fundraising and communication initiatives. Thank you to the many foundations, corporations and individuals that contributed generously this year, including Canada Life, The Catharine Maxwell Meighen Foundation, and the Tippet Foundation.

This year saw an increase in our core funding from the Ministry of Seniors and Accessibility. We also received project funding from the Ministry through Seniors Active Living Centre Special Grants and an Ontario Seniors Community Grant. We were pleased to receive funding for our summer employees through both the provincial and federal government.

TREASURER'S REPORT (CONT)

Other projects were delivered with the support of the New Horizons for Seniors program of Employment and Social Development Canada, Community One Foundation and Help Age Canada. A capital grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation gave us the opportunity to replace our aging appliances, furniture and equipment at our Camp Sunshine program.

This year, we took over the Seniors Assistance Home Maintenance Program from another organization which had dissolved. This program is funded by the City of Toronto and it supports seniors to live safely and independently in their own homes. As always, we greatly appreciate the support from the City of Toronto and the United Way Greater Toronto for our programs and services. We would like to express our thanks to our government and community partners who provide space for our programs: Toronto Community Housing Corporation, Toronto Seniors Housing Corporation, and the City of Toronto.

We continue to look for much-needed support to maintain our services and meet our growth goals where our services and programs are most needed. We are managing our program costs accordingly and we have strategies in place to maintain our fundraising revenue to help support our programs and services.

I would particularly like to thank the staff for their continued diligent, accurate and thoughtful work preparing these reports and our underlying financial records.
